The Te Puke High School Enviro Committee is made up of young environmentally conscious enthusiasts who want to reduce the carbon footprint of the school. The students have already been successful in winning funding for new Solar Panels which now sit on the roof of the Performing Arts block, The Solar Panels will provide approximately 10,000 KWhs a year. equivalent to two average Te Puke houses, or the carbon equivalent of taking 3 petrol cars off the road. The school also relies on a lot of gas heating, which the Enviro Committee would like to replace with heat pumps. Carbon zero is a long way off, but the school has plenty of roof space to go around! They are also looking at improving recycling and electricity waste. Te Puke High School would like to thank and acknowledge TECT and the Bay of Plenty Regional Council who provided the funding for hot water timing switches and solar panels recently installed at school.

One of our very own Te Puke High School Year 13 students, Sam Tomaszyk is co-directing and heading up production for his first feature film called 'The Man She Weeps'.
